In case you didn't know about our channel I wanted to share with you three interviews in particular that I think you and your guild members would find very interesting as weavers and spinners.

Here are some episodes that are of special interest to spinners:

Episode 29 – Tarndie – Home of the Polwarth

We interview Tom Dennis whose ancestor first developed the Polwarth sheep breed which is a wonderful fleece for spinning. Tom is still farming Polwarth sheep, descendants from the original flock in Victoria Australia and is now the 6th generation to farm the original homestead. They sell Polwarth fleece and tops all around the world.

Episode 24 – Shetland Wool with Oliver Henry

Oliver Henry is the top wool classer of Shetland's Jamieson and Smith. He is a well-respected expert on Shetland sheep and their fleeces. Oliver was responsible for first setting up the 'Shetland Wool Week'.

Episode 23 - Fleece and Fibre with Deb Robson

Deb Robson's book the 'Fleece and Fibre Sourcebook is a well-respected reference for spinners, dyers, knitters and weavers. Deb researched over 200 sheep breed fleeces.

Episode 7 – Philosopher's Wool Company

Ann and Eugene Bourgeois founded the Canadian Philosopher's Wool Company in the late 80s to support sustainable agriculture and to produce wool yarn that is natural and organic. They became very well known for buying fleece from Ontario farmers at a decent price by profit sharing and selling their Canadian yarn kits for Fair Isle sweater, shawls and cardigan throughout Canada and North America.

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
