# **Call for CNY Fiber Producers**

Kristi Wiedemann is a PhD Candidate at the Rutgers Bloustein School. She is conducting a survey/interview of fiber producers

The purpose of the study is exploratory in nature. It is being conducted for the following reasons:

- 1) to find out who is working with fiber (e.g., producing, gathering, hunting) in Central NY
- 2) to find out how people are working with fiber
- 3) to gain an initial understanding of what is being valued by people working with fiber
- 4) to gain an understanding of how those values are being realized in practice or not
- 5) to gather relevant background information (e.g., trends, policies).

#### What will I be asked to do if I take part in the study?

If you are a subject-area expert with knowledge of fiber trends or practices in Central NY, you will be asked about background information such as general trends and policies and about other practitioners or other subject area experts you might know of. The interview will be carried out either via video conference (Zoom), by phone, or in-person and a digital transcript (from recorded audio) may be generated for research purposes.

If you work with fiber in Central NY, you will be asked questions about what you value about working with it and how those values are being realized in practice or not, as well as background information. The PI may request take photographs of you with any relevant aspects of fiber production (products, tools, animals, etc.), with your consent. If you are aware of others who work with fiber, you will be asked who is working with fiber, the type(s) of fiber they work with, what practices they do, as well as general background information about fiber.

Kristi Wiedemann will share a summary of the interview with the subjects within four weeks of completing the interview. She will re-share the final summary after incorporating any comments within two weeks of receiving comments. All interviews are confidential and will not be shared with other subjects.

#### CNY Fiber Arts Festival: Viv Fulton Memorial Weaving Competition

The annual Viv Fulton Memorial Weaving Competition is open to weavers of any experience level, both adults and teens. There are three categories: Home Decor, Wearables, and Novice. Entries will be judged on originality and execution and may be made from any natural fiber, including bamboo, rayon and Tencel<sup>™</sup>. Up to four weavings may be entered; the entry form must be completed by June 1st. Get your creative weaving juices flowing and plan to enter the competition!




