
Roc Day 2026 Competition

Angelika St. Laurent

Objective: Create a scarf inspired by the photo of Taughannock Fall in Winter*.

Rules: All yarn and thread used in the project has to be handspun by the person submitting the project, this includes warp yarn, sewing thread etc. The scarf may be constructed with any fiber art technique known to humankind. Any fiber or blend may be used. If you want color, you may either dye your own fiber at any state of the process or resort to commercially dyed fiber. The finished object has to be submitted latest at Roc Day 2026, January 10th, by 10:30am. With the submission add a note about which fibers and techniques you used in the creation of the scarf and how they relate to the photo-inspiration.

All submitted scarfs will be judged in three categories: Most Beautiful, Best Interpretation of the Photo (both by public vote), and Best Technique (by a team of judges).



The guild has a limited number of 8-ounce bags of white Finn 2 wool available for members, who do not feel they have suitable fiber in their stash for the project.

Column: Zoe Goes to Grad School

Zoe Gras is on an exciting journey in an MFA program in textiles. Zoe will be sharing dispatches from her experience here!

Hello all, it's been a busy month! I went to the Kings County Fiber Festival and was a human bobbin in a bobbin lace demonstration, where I finally got to meet the incredible Elena Kanagy-Loux, who is doing her PhD at Bard. I then had midterms and a big art critique, which went well, as all the professors liked my work. My class then went to the Antonio Ratti Textile Center and Reference Library at The Met, where we were able to see historical lace in person and learn more about lace techniques and how they progressed through the centuries. Next, of course, was the Rhinebeck Sheep and Wool festival, where one of my classmates and I pet some sheep and bought some fiber. It was so nice to be back in upstate New York and see all the fall foliage. I then had a week intensive in Sensory Design, where I explored how to use materials to activate all the senses when exploring art. This week was really impactful for me and led to some breakthroughs in how I could use lights to create shadows through textiles. You can see this in the image below, which is my most recent project, depicting a memory of swimming in Cayuga Lake. In person, you can move the lights around, which creates different types of shadows depending on where you put them. I also used a fan to get the pieces of thread to sway, and to add an auditory element. In the coming month, I am going to continue using handspun yarn and a knitting machine to see what interesting textures I can get when I felt a knit.
