Roc Day Challenge 2023

The Challenge is due at this April's Guild meeting! See you there!

If you cannot come to the April meeting, you can get in touch with other Guild members to pick up your sample and submit it for you.

This year's Roc Day challenge will build on the silk spinning workshop with Nancy Morey, though attendance is not necessary for participating in the challenge. Brief details are below, and more will come as get get closer!

Use the 2+ ozs. top of tussah silk top to spin a two ply yarn. Spin S and ply Z. Use regular plying, no special plying techniques such as boucle, spiral, or slub. Use only the fiber provided with no dyeing or additions of any kind.

You can create any gauge yarn you want, fat or spider web thin. Judges will be looking for even twist, appropriate plying twist, consistent thickness of yarn, durability of the structure (that it doesn't fall apart when pulled)

Spinning Teachers Requested

A request from Bruce:

I wanted to invite you – if you are available- to come and help out with wheel spinning for my 7-wee Cornell class (ANSC4940) on wool production and processing. I know some of you have come in the past and demonstrated spinning for Dr. Thonney's sheep class (which was not offered this year). Last year I skipped the drop spindle step and had them go right to the wheel but this year I have added a week for the spindle (4/14 and 4/17).

The class has 2 sections, one on Fridays and one on Mondays, both are from 1:30 to 4:30 and start with a short power point presentation. I have ~12 students per lab day and have 12 wheels available for them. The dates are Friday 4/21 and Monday 4/24 (spinning some med. wool from the Cornell sheep) and again Friday 4/28 and Monday 5/1 (spinning fine/long wool and other fibers).

Wooly Adventures in Ireland

My husband Dave and I, went to Ireland for 3 weeks in March. Our daughter Lucia is doing aninternship at Childvision, in Dublin, an organization that provides equine assisted therapy for blind and neurodiverse children. Our daughter Naomi joined us for the first week on her college break. It's a wool & traditional music lovers paradise. One of our first stops was the Kerry Woolen Mills, in county Kerry. The mill is over 300 years old, though of course the equipment has been updated. They are one of the last traditional mills. They go from raw fleece to yarn, doing their own cleaning, carding and dyeing, and spinning. They machine weave a variety of products including scarves, blankets, clothing made from their fabric, yarns, & rovings. They do machine weaving. We were lucky enough to be there when one of the owners was available and she gave us a tour.



We also visiting a traditional mill in county Donegal, Studio Donegal, that is trying to preserve all of the old skills. Their Donegal tweed is still handwoven on a fly shuttle loom, they card and dye some of their yarns, and get the rest from the Donegal Tweed Yarn mill around the corner. They also have garment makers putting their clothing together instead of sending it out to Morocco to be made. Their prices are competitive with other mills/wool shops, and is so beautiful. They also sell their own yarn.

And of course, sheep everywhere. I took pictures of a herd of black sheep, very rare. Ireland is an amazingly beautiful place, and I loved connecting to the fiber arts there. It was also an exercise in controlling spending, as we had no checked baggage, so couldn't go crazy buying things we couldn't afford. The same urge we have here to build our yard and fiber stashes is alive and well in Ireland.

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
