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Message from the President

Dear Fellow Spinners,

We got a bit of a taste of winter this weekend and now I'm all excited about warm woolen things and spinning the yarn for it. Conveniently, there is our next guild meeting coming on this Saturday, 2-11-23, from 11am-3pm, in the Parish Hall of the All Saints Catholic Church in Lansing, 347 Ridge Road.

Our February guild meeting features a workshop: Our very own Arija Restberg will teach Baltic style pick-up weaving. We will start with the instructions at the beginning of the meeting. So everyone has time to pick colors, warp, and weave during the course of the meeting. Arija will be bringing all the necessary materials. If you are interesting in taking a belt-weaving kit home, these will cost \$15 – however, you can use them during the meeting for free. Please check out the information on the event in the newsletter and the email that has gone out earlier, especially, if you are interested in making a weaving frame.

Members, who are not interested in belt-weaving, are invited to spin and socialize as usual.

We also have a speaker for our March meeting (3-11-23). Judy Maierhofer will teach us about the traditional spinning style of the Blackfoot nation and talk about her work on maintaining the Navajo Churro breed of sheep. Judy will bring spindles as they are traditionally used, which can be purchased. Members interested in trying out a traditional spindle are asked to speak up ahead of time, so there will be enough spindles.

Roc Day Challenge 2023

This year's Roc Day challenge will build on the silk spinning workshop with Nancy Morey, though attendance is not necessary for participating in the challenge. Brief details are below, and more will come as get get closer!

Use the 2+ ozs. top of tussah silk top to spin a two ply yarn. Spin S and ply Z. Use regular plying, no special plying techniques such as boucle, spiral, or slub. Use only the fiber provided with no dyeing or additions of any kind.

You can create any gauge yarn you want, fat or spider web thin. Judges will be looking for even twist, appropriate plying twist, consistent thickness of yarn, durability of the structure (that it doesn't fall apart when pulled)

February Weaving Workshop

Arija will be running a belt-weaving workshop for the Guild this February! Thank you so much for volunteering to set this up, Arija.

Details on the workshop and on how to prepare your own loom, should you want one, are in this newsletter.

Kits will be available for free during the meeting, and they will be \$15 if you would like to purchase one to bring home.







February Weaving Workshop: Loom Kits


Alternate tie-off methods will be taught during the meeting, but if you would like to prepare and make your own loom, here are instructions. Feel free to contact Arija for help


The kits available at the meeting will contain: three dowels (1 round and 2 squares) 2 screws and wing nuts, a ridge heddle, fish net needle, a ruler and needle threader. You can choose your own thread color.

To make your own loom:

If you would like to use wood, you will need to buy a 10" and 18" stretch bars of the sort pictured. They can be ordered through Amazon, Michaels, or Jo-Ann Fabrics.

If you want to make a PVC Pipe Loom, you will need to buy 1" PVC PIPE that measures 76" long. You will also need to buy 2 of A and 4 of B pipe connector parts.

Silk Hankies

If you attended November's silk spinning workshop, Kay Stickane sent in an article about working with the "handkerchief" style of silk fiber that may be of interest. The full article is here:

"Multiple silk hankies have found their way to my stash over the years- they are just so pretty with their vibrant, saturated colors! And I have tried to spin them using the commonly-recommended technique of poking a hole through one thin layer and gradually stretching the sheet into a thinner, larger ring. Then you simply pull the ring apart at one point, and you have a pre-drafted length of silk ready to spin on a drop-spindle or wheel. (Because the silk is so "grippy" in hankie form, you can also knit this strand, as it can handle being pulled on somewhat.) It sounds simple and straighforward, but sadly, I just never enjoyed the process. It took so much hand strength for me to get the silk stretched to a thin, consistent strand, and the very large loop/strand had to be managed carefully to avoid tangles. The most I ever spun was a wee sample skein of a few yards or so. So pretty, but not enough to motivate me to persevere."

Indigo Dye

A few years ago, the Guild held a natural dying workshop which proved to us all just how difficult it can be to work with indigo (I seem to recall we got overexcited and oxidized our batch, leading to no indigo for anybody). Kay sent in an interesting article about the history of this dye plant.

"The sky on a clear day. The water of the oceans. Robin eggs in a nest. A pair of jeans. What do these have in common? The color blue! For Colonial Americans the color blue could only be obtained through one source: the indigo plant. Indigo became a popular crop to grow in a specific region of the southern colonies and is an unexpected agricultural product that came from America's colonial period."


