Minutes of the June Meeting

The June meeting hosted important discussions on the Guild's plans going forward. Please see the details below.

Next meetings: Our July (7-9-22), August (8-13-22), and September (9-10-22) meetings will be held at the Brooktondale Community Center (524 Valley Road, Brooktondale). The first two hours of these meetings will be coinciding with the Brooktondale Farmer's market. Suzanne will play music during the first two hours of the meeting in July and August. As long as we are meeting at the Farmer's market, the official part of the meeting will start shortly past 1pm.

We plan to return to the Parish Hall in Lansing (347 Ridge Road, Lansing) for our October meeting (10-8—22) and meet there over the winter.

Special activities at meetings: We found it would be good to have some sort of special activity in some of our meetings, such as a tutorial or demonstration. We will start out doing that every three months. Arija will be the first teacher. On our September meeting (9-10-22) Arija will teach band weaving. She is going to buy heddles for this from guild funds. Attendees will be able to purchase these heddles after the class.

On the October meeting (10-9-22) we are planning to hold our traditional guild garage sale. Members interested in giving a presentation/leading a workshop are invited to step forward.

New guild officers: Due to Covid we have gone for two years without elections. We will hold elections of guild officers on our October meeting. Members interested in holding an office are heartily encouraged to step forward.

Marianne volunteered to be the new person in charge of classes. We do need a new Roc Day Coordinator. (Yvonne has since volunteered for this position.) We are also looking for a person in charge of guild owned equipment.



Roc Day: Roc Day was small, but those able to attend had a good time. It was felt that as small a crowd as this Roc Day drew might be too small to make things worth the while for vendors. Our paper bag raffle did not bring in much funds (just enough to cover the rent for Roc Day itself), because of low attendance. Generally, it was felt that the Brooktondale Community Center was a good place to hold such an event.

There are many open questions on how Roc Day will happen in the future:

Do we want to go back to a larger event open to the public or keep things small on member only basis?

If we want to hold an event with vendors, we need to invite people from other guilds and the general public. In order to do that, we need to set publicity into action about three months before the event.

At what time, should we hold the next Roc Day?

Considering the spikes in Covid cases during the holiday season the last two years, it is rather likely, that we might see a similar spike this year. A celebration in early January would likely be affected by that. The Parish Hall in Lansing is a nice place to hold an event in winter. If we decide to celebrate in January, we need to come up with a plan on how to avoid this becoming a disease-spreading event. Some members feel comfortable requiring and checking immunization records. However, others feel less comfortable with this approach.

During the warmer time of the year, we could resort to an outdoors location. In this case, there would be no need to check immunization records etc. 'Roc Day' as the name of the event held in spring wouldn't be quite fitting, but maybe something like 'Spin into Spring' would sound nice.

A celebration date in fall, before the holidays might also be an option. However, some people might be less eager to shop, with the holidays approaching – on the other hand, some people might use the opportunity to buy gifts.

If we change the date/name of our event, we will reduce the recognition factor, drawing in less people. However, starting with publicity in time, we might make up for this problem. We need to hear members' opinions and ideas on how we will go forward with this. Please, don't be shy to email or talk at our next meeting.

Our Money: At the moment, the guild has \$5000.

This is enough that we can consider inviting a teacher for a spinning workshop. We also have enough money to buy nice fiber for our next spinning challenge






