A Dyeing Workshop in Blue and Pink

With Wayne Harbert

A Report on the Dyers' Workshop Wayne Harbert

Good news first. We enjoyed a pleasant afternoon spinning and dyeing together, and learned a

few things. The black walnut hull pot yielded its expected earthy brown. Especially nice was the cotton scarf pre-mordanted with sumac leaves that Rachel dyed after tying it for an interesting pattern.





Onion skins yielded the surprising orange that Lynn is showing off.

The madder and walnut leaf pots yielded similarly pleasing results, shown in the examples that Renata is holding.



The much-vaunted Japanese indigo vat, on the other hand, was, in a word, a disaster. We seem to have seriously overloaded it, and have introduced too much dreaded oxygen, which rendered

the indigo chemical inert. I was afraid that this was happening, as the vat became progressively bluer when we were adding fiber to it. In retrospect, I think that the mesh bags may have been partly at fault, harboring too much air as they were immersed, as was the progressive agitation that came with adding more and more fiber, and trying to keep the mass submerged. In any case, the dyeing effect was very weak. Some of the fiber at the bottom of the pot came out stained with a bit of blue, but that was it. Oh, well. Negative results are also results. I've rinsed all of the fiber out, and will give it a another try with my second harvest of Japanese indigo, which I've just picked in advance of this weekend's promised frost. (Remarkably, we won't get our first frost up here on the hill until November.). I'll let you know how it comes out. As I cautioned before, success is not guaranteed. That's what makes it an adventure.



Another of our experiments moved our understanding forward by giving mixed results. It turns out you can in fact get pleasing pinks from avocado pits, by chopping them (carefully), putting them in a canning jar full of water, with 1/4 cup of ammonia added per quart, and letting them sit for a week or more, adding new pits as they become available. This is a good thing, since eating ten avocados at a sitting is probably not advisable. Contrary to

what I'd read, though, soaking the fiber in the cold solution isn't sufficient to impart the color to it. I did that for ten days, and the yarn still came out white after rinsing. But straining the pleasingly red liquid through cheesecloth and then simmering the fiber in it for an hour (120 degrees) and leaving it in the pot to cool resulted in the pleasing pink in the picture. The experiment with avocado skins is still ongoing.

For those of you who left fiber in the walnut leaf pot and the goldenrod pot, I'll bring it to the November meeting, as well as a vest I think someone left here.



Roc Day 2020 Spinning and Knitting/Crochet Challenge

Spin 3.5 oz of Targee wool roving to create yarn. Spinning techniques are your choice – any gauge, any ply, any technique. Use the yarn you spin to knit or crochet a neck warmer (can't be a scarf or a shawlette). You may choose the pattern. Use **only the fiber provided** with no dyeing or additions of any kind. It is not necessary to use all the fiber. It is necessary to use only the fiber provided. Turn in your neck



warmer to the contest table by 10:30 AM or earlier as the judges need time to consider entries.

There will be two judgings: one by people's choice and one by Black Sheep members for proficiency of spinning, knitting or crocheting.

2019 Small Ruminant Management and Fiber Conference – Registration deadline Oct 31st!

Morrison Hall, Cornell University, Ithaca, NY on November 9th and 10th, 2019

Sponsored by Cashmere Goat Association and the Cornell Sheep & Goat Program

This conference is aimed at prospective and experienced goat and sheep raisers and is also relevant to fiber enthusiasts, designers and processors, as well as youth, college students and professionals interested in small ruminant research. Speakers include nationally renowned fiber specialists and farmers such as Wini Labrecque as well as veterinarians and researchers from Cornell University, Langston University's internationally acclaimed Goat Research Center, and Virginia Tech. Saturday morning's presentations focus primarily on flock and herd health. Dr. Mary Smith DVM will start the conference by guiding us through setting up a flock/herd health management program with a second presentation on coping with foot and skin issues in small ruminants. Saturday afternoon activities include hands-on practicals on nutrition, lambing/kidding, hoof care, body condition scoring and conformation evaluation. Saturday's activities will also include discussions on parasites, fiber basics and marketing, and developing breed databases. Sunday morning presentations will cover cashmere genetics, genetics for color in fiber goats and sheep, and nutrition for follicle development and fiber production in small ruminants. Afternoon activities include hands-on labs evaluating cashmere, mohair, wool, alpaca and vicuna and presentations on designing and marketing fiber products taking into account the scale of production. Attendees will also have the opportunity to learn more about proactive farm management to improve livestock/predator coexistence and farm /wildlife habitat from Dr. Nora Desmond, DVM of Chianti Cashmere, Italy. The hands-on, specialized cashmere, mohair, wool, alpaca fiber evaluation classes are designed to increase the expertise of goat/sheep/alpaca farmers and fiber mills/designers responding to the increased interest in American fiber.

For people attending both days, the fee is \$80 for non-members of the Cashmere Goat Association (CGA) and \$65 for members of CGA. The fee to attend a single day (be it Saturday or Sunday) is \$50 for both CGA members and non-members. It's a fun event held at Casowasco Camp & Retreat Center we stay in Galilee

Galilee

Galilee is the renovated, former summer home of the Case Family. The history of the building melds beautifully with hotel-style accommodations, creating an ideal place for groups to meet. This is the building most guests equate with Casowasco because of its history, location (on the lake), and beauty.

The Rusty Best Memorial Library features an unmatched view of Owasco Lake and a cozy place to enjoy a book. Galilee also has a large living room that is typically used as the main meeting area for groups. The 2nd Floor has seen the most work and has become one of the most luxurious place to stay on site. Almost all of the bedrooms feature their own full baths and a beautiful view.

Galilee includes 12 bedrooms, 10 bathrooms, and 9 showers to accommodate up to 29 guests. Pillows and blankets are included with each room. The building features a piano, kitchenette, two gas fireplaces, and two covered porches. The larger porch has been updated for extended use in colder seasons with a transparent vinyl enclosure and propane patio heater. The campfire circle is located a short distance off the south porch, along the shore of Owasco Lake.

History

The history of Galilee is part of its unique charm. The building we now call Galilee was the former summer home of Theodore and Gertrude Case. Built in 1896 and uniquely designed to fit the contour of the shoreline, it quickly became the centerpiece of the Case estate. The rail road that runs along the property dropped off many famous guests during those years - including an alleged visit by Mr. Walt Disney. After the purchase of the property in 1946, Galilee began to undergo what would be several changes, all with the intent of making the building into a retreat facility. In the late 70's, it was almost closed for lack of funds to make the upgrades - but through volunteer work and an aggressive fund raising campaign, Galilee survived. Recent history has been very good to the facility. A large gift given by Peg Shields in the name of her parents, the Vetters, has enabled a massive renovation - insuring that this beautiful piece of history will be used for many years to come.

General Fun stuff <u>Basic Muffins</u>

Marilee Williams contributed the following recipe.

Asa Ransom House, Clarence, NY

2 c. unbleached flour*	¹ ⁄2 c. oil
1 c. whole wheat flour*	2 large eggs (combined with fruit suggested below)
1 Tbsp. baking powder	1 ¹ / ₂ c. milk (variable, depending on how moist fruit is)

1 c. sugar

*I use 3 c. organic whole wheat pastry flour

1. Preheat oven to 350 and grease 18 muffin cups.

2. Whisk together dry ingredients. Add combined remaining ingredients; avoid overmixing. Fill muffin cups (I find 1/3 c. measure works well) and bake 15-20 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center of muffin comes out clean. Cool 5 min in muffin tins then remove to cool on rack.

Variations: (to be added with eggs to basic mixture)

- $\frac{1}{2}$ c. crushed pineapple
- $\frac{1}{2}$ c. crushed pineapple and $\frac{1}{2}$ c. coconut
- 3 mashed ripe bananas
- 2 mashed ripe bananas and ¹/₂ c. diced strawberries
- 1 tsp. each of cinnamon, nutmeg, allspice and 1 c. raisins
- 1 c. chopped cranberries and 1 tsp. grated orange rind
- 1 c. blueberries and 1 tsp. grated lemon rind
- 1 c. pureed pumpkin or squash and 1 chopped apple

This recipe always turns out well no matter the variation. Use your imagination and enjoy!

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
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
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
