Roc Day Challenge

This year's challenge is to create a hat that incorporates beads. For this you will receive a bit more than 4 ounces of white Falkland top and sixty Czech glass beads in assorted colors.

The rules are:

- 1) No other materials than the ones provided may be used for the hat.
- 2) At a minimum, there have to be 20 securely attached beads on the finished hat.



Any fiber art (e.g. knitting, crocheting, weaving, braiding, felting) or combination thereof is allowed in the construction of the hat. The fiber may be dyed. The beads may be attached in whichever way fits the design the best (e.g. spun into the yarn, set while knitting, embroidered on). If choosing embroidery, note that the thread has to be spun from the fiber provided. A brief tutorial on spinning with beads is included in this newsletter.










Finished hats should be submitted latest by 10:30 am on January 11th, 2025. With the submission, include a short description of the methods used. Judging will happen by popular vote in the categories 'Most Beautiful', 'Most Creative', and 'Most Practical'.

Fiber in Literature

Jen wrote in about an interesting book she found with a strong grounding in spinning and weaving in 18th and 19th century England, The Armor of Light by Ken Follet. It is technically the part of a series called Kingsbridge, but it seems that you can read one without reading the others. If you are interested in historical fiction, the series follows stories set in the same town in England (Kingsbridge) over the course of a millenia, exploring major points in England's history. The latest novel follows the industrial revolution, and particularly the developments in textile technology. Jen will bring a copy to the Guild next meeting, and here's so more information if you're interested!

A note from Rachael: if you've read any fantasy, you may know Ken Follet as the author of Pillars of the Earth, an excellent and well-known series.



Book summary: The Spinning Jenny was invented in 1770, and with that, a new era of manufacturing and industry changed lives everywhere within a generation. A world filled with unrest wrestles for control over this new world order: A mother's husband is killed in a work accident due to negligence; a young woman fights to fund her school for impoverished children; a well-intentioned young man unexpectedly inherits a failing business; one man ruthlessly protects his wealth no matter the cost, all the while war cries are heard from France, as Napoleon sets forth a violent master plan to become emperor of the world. As institutions are challenged and toppled in unprecedented fashion, ripples of change ricochet through our characters' lives as they are left to reckon with the future and a world they must rebuild from the ashes of war.






How to Integrate Beads

Our 2025 Roc Day Challenge requires that beads be incorporated into the finished hat. There are many ways, in which beads can be added to a project. I'm showing four different methods. I'm sure there are plenty more out there.

1. Adding beads while spinning: This requires the use of a thin stiff bit of thread or dental floss.



It is possible to fix the bead to the single by spinning a bit of fiber with the beaded sliver. If the beaded thread is plied, the bead will be held in position by the plying thread.



2. String beads on single before plying: After spinning singles, one can thread beads to one or multiple of the intended plies and then ply. A bit of dental floss, a needle with a fine enough eye to fit through the bead, or a fine crochet hook can help with the stringing. The resulting yarn looks identical to the yarn produced with method one.

When working with yarn that has the beads held in place with a ply, the positioning of the bead will depend only on its position in the yarn. This approach works well, if the intention is to produce a randomized distribution of beads. However, the bead could end up on the wrong side of the fabric.









3. String beads on finished yarn: For more control over the final location of the bead in the finished option, one can string the beads onto a finished yarn. The beads provided for the Roc Day Challenge have a 2mm hole, which should allow them to be strung on worsted weight or thinner yarn. The bead can then be slid into position, when needed. Note that a pre-strung bead will show up in a finished product either on one leg of a stich or between stitches.



4. <u>Place beads individually during garment construction:</u> This is the way to place a bead in an exact position.



Slide the stitch from the needle and thread a bit of dental floss through it. Alternatively, a fine crochet hook works.



Use the dental floss to pull the bead over the stitch. After this, slide the stitch back on the left needle and continue knitting.

With this method, the bead will cover both legs of a knitted stitch or a loop of a crocheted stitch.

All four methods will securely incorporate a bead into a finished object. Unless the object is frogged, the beads won't come loose or change their position.
