August 11 Meeting

If you have ever started spinning a colorful pile of fiber and ended up with a pile of mud-colored yarn, this is the class for you. This class will explore techniques for creating exactly the effect you want with space-dyed top or roving. I will be focusing on setting up the spinning of colorways when you have a desired final project in mind.

Some topics that I will touch on will include choosing fiber thickness to control striping, reorganizing color sequences, how plying choice affects color, and choosing a colorway that complements your spinning choices. I will have a limited number of one-ounce pieces of fiber to work with.

I encourage everyone to bring fiber, yarn, or FOs made from space-dyed fiber so that we can analyze what makes them so great, or how to improve them if you were disappointed with the result. 1

Four half-day workshops will be offered. There are 16 seats available for each session. Each workshop is \$45 for guild members and \$55 others. The workshop fee must be paid at registration and is non refundable. Material fees (in parenthesis) will be collected at the door on the day of your class. Guild member registration began at the May meeting and will run through the August meeting. After that the remaining spaces will be offered to the public.

NOTE: ALL WORKSHOPS WITH THE EXCEPTION OF WHEEL MECHANICS CAN BE TAKEN WITH A DROP SPINDLE

Saturday, Nov 3, 9am to noon Getting More Done With Spindles (\$25 mtls)

For those who already spin with spindles a little or a lot, for wheel spinners who want to know how to make the spindle more productive. This class is just your ticket. Learn where your personal bottlenecks are, learn techniques to speed up various spindle tasks, learn to spin various kinds of yarn and different fibers. Bring a spindle you love or one you hate. A basic low whorl spindle and fiber will be provided.

Saturday, Nov 3, 1-4pm, Wheel Mechanics (\$30 mtls)

Learn about drive systems, tensioning mechanisms, ratios, treadle systems, flyer design, and how all these things affect your wheel's performance and the yarn you produce. How, when, and why would you choose one system over another, or make setup changes? How can you troubleshoot mechanical problems? How can you change settings on your wheel to change the yarn you are spinning? Fiber will be supplied and wheels with multiple drive systems will be present but you should bring your own wheel.

Sunday, Nov 4, 9am-noon Drafting: The Long and Short of It (\$30 mtls)

What is the difference between long draw and short draw? Does it matter? Why should you choose one or the other? What difference does it make in your finished yarn? Are some fibers or preparations more suited to one or the other? We will talk about these subjects, learn to execute a range of drafting methods with a variety of fibers. Bring a wheel or spindle and fiber will be supplied.

Sunday, Nov 4, noon to 4pm Plying Basics (\$20 mtls)

Often overlooked, plying is actually its own whole skill set. There are many plying structures which bring different benefits to your yarn, and this class will help you decide which you'd like to use and make sure you can get that done. We'll cover the differences between singles, 2 ply, 3 ply, more than 3 ply, cabled yarn and crepe yarn. Participants should bring a wheel in good working order and or a spindle they like, a lazy kate with at least 4 bobbins. Optional: niddy noddy, skeiner, ball winder or nostepinne. Fiber will be supplied.


