The contacts she has made have all wanted her to take a course in order to learn to spin. As she has stated, she is a "weaver" and at her present "young" age of 88, she does not want to "spin" but rather "weave".

I was hoping you might be able to help us find a spinner who would take on the task of spinning some wool for us. We would expect to pay for this time consuming art and would be able to ship the wool if someone would be interested and kind enough to help my elderly friend.

Any information and/or suggestions would be so greatly appreciated.

CELIA QUINN WORKSHOP

There was lots of learning and fun at the Hampton Court in Cortland, NY this weekend. **Celia Quinn**, noted spinning instructor and writer from Homer, Alaska, taught two workshops to a full classroom of enthusiastic spinners, mostly from our guild.

Saturday, Spinning to Spec. was all about wraps and twists per inch. From newbies to veteran spinners, we all spun outside our comfort zones, from as thin as possible on a fine combed Merino, to pencil-roving fatness on coarser fibers. Celia pointed out how some fibers were more appropriate for fine versus thicker spinning. We all tried spinning the same fiber, to the same specifications (20 wraps and 5 twists per inch) and were delighted to see how similarly most of our samples came out.

Celia brought wonderful samples of her yarns and various knitted and woven items to illustrate her teaching points. She talked about not trying to make "perfect" yarn, because we're human and there is variation in everything we do. Nonetheless, her work was pretty spectacular and consistent. Her teaching empowered even the least experienced in the group to try planning and controlling our yarns a bit more than we have in the past. She shared many tips and tricks for measuring and testing yarn, and for deciding what kinds of fibers and what spinning decisions are appropriate for particular projects. "Sample, sample and sample" she advised. "Measure frequently to help maintain consistency." She taught us to calculate Grist (yards per pound) so we could compare one bobbin or skein of a project to another, and how to determine if our skeins were within a 10% tolerance of each other.

On Sunday (Novelty Yarns) we spun samples of Alpaca, Merino, Mohair and several other yarns. Celia steamed the samples to take the liveliness out of them (normally this happens naturally when the yarn is left on a bobbin for several days). We then plied these yarns using different techniques to create beaded yarns, seed yarn, precise Navajo 3-ply yarns with deliberate color changes, mohair "halo" yarn, Knickerbocker yarn (multicolored silk noil carded into white Merino top), glitz - blended alpaca with firestar, Garnetted yarn (with thread waste), and even Shifu "au lait", which was made from coffee filters! The trickiest project was the boucle, or "boo-hoo-cle" (at right), as Celia called it. Combed mohair top was plied with dyed silk and then re-plied with a decorative sewing thread. Challenging, but lots of fun. Celia suggested to us that novelty yarns be used in small quantities, as accents, rather than for large projects, as they are so time-consuming.

Celia's high energy, extensive experience and knowledge, and down-to-earth personable manner made it a fun and informative weekend. (She was delighted, by the way, that there was a Homer, NY nearby, and was tickled to receive Homer T-shirts to take home!) A great guild-sponsored program, and many thanks to Celia and to our guild members who organized it.


